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effect of just about wiping out the business in these licenses to carry these pistols. I do not, for the life of me, understand why none of the senators can accept the challenge of giving us a case that would justify the enactment of this bill into law. The NRA is the only one that I can think of that wants this. And they've heated up a lot of people out there, who wear these big, old fur coats without sleeves on 'em, but those are not the ones we ought to take our orders from or even take seriously the recommendations they make when the recommendations deal with...will deal with something like what this bill talks about. So, if Senator Janssen.... He's not on the floor. I see Senator Tyson. I'd like to ask him a question. Senator Tyson, would you yield to a question?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Tyson, maybe you haven't read all of the bill in detail, but do you believe that even if this bill were enacted, with all of the amendments that people are proposing which are supposed to tighten it up, do you believe that bill would be a net fine enough to prevent those who you and I might think shouldn't have these guns and a license to carry them, concealed, from obtaining them? In other words, do you think there are some who will get through the net who ought not be carrying concealed weapons?

SENATOR TYSON: Yes, Senator, those people are carrying them right now, they are called criminals.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I agree, and you have a lot of 'em in your district, but they call themselves law abiding citizens. When they carry a concealed weapon outside the law, then they're criminals, right?

SENATOR TYSON: Senator, people in my district are law abiding citizens by definition.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if they carry a pistol outside...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.
