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is a different situation. I would like to ask Senator Janssen a question, if I may.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen, would you yield to a question from Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen,...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, Senator Schimek has gone through, more than once, some of the things that the State Patrol is going to have to do in administering this bill. Are you absolutely convinced that a fee of \$100 is going to give them enough money to do all of the things that they're required to do, under this bill?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Chambers, from what I have...from visiting with the State Patrol, yes, I am convinced that they can do this.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose they cannot. What happens?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I would imagine that we would probably have to raise the fee because I do not want the people of the state of Nebraska to have to take any liability on general tax dollars supporting this bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, I don't see Senator Stuhr right now, she might be in her office sticking pins in that little doll that is made to look like me, but yesterday we were discussing her bill and I had pointed out that the bill ought to say precisely the amount of money that was going to be appropriated under that bill.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Using that same approach on this one, I don't believe \$100 is going to do that. But let me ask you a question. How many people are expected to seek these licenses?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, it...there again, Senator Chambers, it
