SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, I hope not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We wouldn't want them to...

SENATOR JANSSEN: I would not want them to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...but might that happen?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I would not want that to happen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Could there be so much frustration at having these people battering at the windows and knocking down the door to get these licenses that they would say, well, maybe we haven't looked as thoroughly at this person...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...as we should but, based on what we've seen, it's worth going on and taking the risk and we'll approve this person; or take it the other way and say, there might be a question with this one so we're just going to say "no" and get that one out of the line? Might those things happen?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I don't believe so. In my opinion, it wouldn't happen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why don't we guard against it by raising the fee?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Because I believe that we'd be discriminating against some people who could not afford that much money. I don't want...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I can't afford to buy a Jaguar. Is that cost discriminating against me other than as always happens when a product is priced beyond the range of somebody who wants it?

SENATOR JANSSEN: That happens on occasion, but you could probably buy a Volkswagon for a lot less money. It'd do the same thing, Senator Chambers.
