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would like to discuss the fiscal note just a little bit more in detail. I just read the fine print in it and I believe that the fiscal note you probably all have in your file folders is without the amendment. But if we adopt the committee amendment we will be asking for \$25 more per license. If we ask for \$25 more per license, we will be taking in an additional \$387,500, presuming that we have 19,500 applications. At that rate, we would still be short \$76,392 for start-up costs. That's presuming we have the maximum number of applications. If we drop a thousand applications, we're going to drop another hundred thousand dollars off of that. We'll be another hundred thousand dollars short and we will not be able to make that up by revenue in the out years. I would like to call your attention to the fact that it says the shortfall in the out years will not support the projected costs of the act over the out years unless supplemented by the General Fund or another source of revenue. And as far as I can tell, the...the amount of money for the renewals is not going to change. It's still going to be \$45. Maybe I should ask Senator Janssen that question, if I might.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen, would you yield to Senator Schimek?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Janssen, I was just talking about the fiscal note on this...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...and I just did some quick figuring and found out that if we raise the amount \$25 as the committee amendment suggests and we have 19,500 applications, we're going to raise another \$387,500. But we'll still be short \$76,392 in that first year for start-up costs, according to the Patrol estimates. In addition to that, as we go along each year there won't be enough money coming in from those applications, according to the Patrol's own estimates, to meet the costs of administering the act. Now, what I want to ask you, and I think I know the answer, but we're not changing the amount of the renewal at all, are we?
