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of the confrontation, you would need to know three separate legal sets of rules in what you can do. Now the bill provides that you're supposed to learn how to handle a gun and I think you're supposed to learn how to use...how...learn these rules also, are you not, Senator Janssen? Or maybe it doesn't provide for learning these rules. Does it?

SENATOR JANSSEN: The question again.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The question was, does your law require that the different statutes of Nebraska with respect to the use of force be learned by a person who's given a concealed weapon permit?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I don't know, because they have not set the criteria yet for that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So we don't even know if they're required...thank you, Senator.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR BEUTLER: We don't even know whether they're required to know these rules, but, assuming for the moment that they are, consider whether you think a person learning these rules in the year 1999 who carries a concealed weapon for three years and then is confronted in a situation where they may pull the weapon, whether they're going to remember three years later these rules that I'm about to read to you, and I suppose I won't get very far, but I suppose I can give you a sense of the complicated nature of these rules because I think I can convey to you that they will not remember them because I can assure you lawyers who work with them are afraid to try to remember them without reading back on each and every occasion. But, for example, with regard to the use of force in self-protection, one of the three rules, it says, subject to the provisions of this section, Section 48-28,414, so the learning process I suppose starts out with a seminar on related statutes, the use of force upon and towards another person is justifiable when the actor believes that such force is immediately necessary for the purpose of protecting himself, so already a judgment comes into play.
