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raised a very interesting question about how many of these guns a person can hide in his or her clothes, then Senator Schimek followed it up. I think we should say that the person is limited to the number of pockets his or her garments will have. Then we at least know they're not going to be hiding these guns everywhere on their person. They've got to hide the guns in their pockets. (Laugh) Right now, they can carry a gun if it's out where people can see it, so if they want to wear six or seven holsters they can do that. If they want to line pistols all the way around their body stuck in their belt, if they want to wear bandoleers of bullets and have pistols stuck in those, they can do that. I imagine the only limitation on the number of pistols you can carry is your physical strength--how many guns can you carry. How many can you afford? This bill is preposterous. The NRA is making a collective jackass out of this Legislature. Yes, I said jackass, and I apologize to the jackass because a jackass is not that stupid. There was a man who had a jackass pulling a wagon and the jackass didn't want to pull it because the jackass felt it was being treated unfairly and the wagon was too heavy. So, Senator Byars, this smart NRA member lit a fire under the jackass and the jackass walked just far enough for the fire to ignite the wagon and burn it up, and that showed which of the two was the more intelligent. Now we have a situation where that organization has this Legislature, some of the members, seriously considering authorizing people to hide these guns in their clothes and they don't even know how many guns you can hide, don't even know under what circumstances you can legally use this gun. And yet, you have these same people talking about law-abiding citizens worried about criminals and that's why you have to let them carry these guns. I say, again, during the years that this...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...bill has been defeated, we were made to believe that all the law-abiding citizens would be stricken from the face of this state by all these criminals out there just waiting to kill them because they don't have these guns hidden in their clothes, and that has not happened. This bill should meet the same fate as its predecessors. And I hope Senator Beutler will continue, if he is of a mind, to read into the record this material directly from the statutes which I defy any
