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Schimek. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I was somewhat...I was somewhat distracted, so maybe Senator Hilgert touched on what I was going to talk about. But people laughed when President Clinton said, in response to something that had been said or not said by him, it depends on what the meaning of "is" is, and, oh, that was hilarious. But I want to talk to Senator Janssen, because we're talking about legal matters now and I want to find out what the meaning of the article "a", the letter A, "a" is. Senator Janssen, would you...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Janssen, would you yield?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I'll try to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Janssen, would you turn to page 2.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum. Got it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, starting in line 25, which you read for us, "Licensee means an individual holding a current and valid license to carry a concealed handgun issued pursuant to the act".

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum. All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Where do you see anything in the law that says the person can carry only one handgun?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Where it says a "license to carry a concealed handgun". To me, that's one handgun.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's to you, but it is not the same as one. Let me ask you a question.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The "a" is an article. It's an indefinite article. "The" is a definite article because it designates a specific identifiable individual. If you say I saw a man last
