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Senator Chambers I do kind of agree with some of the compromise that he's trying to do, but he still has it too high, I wouldn't be able to afford it. I don't know if I want to or not. But I do think it's probably too high there. But I guess one of the things that I've heard a lot this morning is police officers being against this. The only officers that I really know of, that I have heard from, that are against this, and one of them is a real good friend of mine, has been for many years, and it was a misprint in the article that Senator Schimek passed out this morning, I was going to ask her if Stan Grabowski was with the Fraternal Order of Police from Missouri, or Iowa, or where, because he's not from Nebraska. The one that is the head of the Fraternal Order of Police in Nebraska is Steve Grabowski, good friend of mine, has been for many, many years and I respect him. Steve is the right one. And...but anyway, I have heard from the administration of these organizations. I have not heard from the police officers that are out there working. The police officers, I feel, that are out there working, if you go out on the street and talk to them, most of them will tell you they don't care one way or the other or they have no problem with it. If they know that a person is carrying a weapon, I don't think very many of them really feel threatened; if they don't know, they may. But under this bill I think you're required to identify to the officer, if you're stopped, that you are carrying a concealed weapon. And I think that's a lot of standard procedure in Nebraska right now. If you get stopped by an officer, and I'm not saying all of them, because there are exceptions everywhere, but in rural Nebraska especially, if you get stopped and you have a firearm in your vehicle, and you tell them you have it, they're probably not going to bother you. But we hear all of this about the police. And I question whether it's the rank and file officers that are out here on the street, or whether it's the administration. I understand that. I think another thing that we're missing here, I think there's a lot of people in my district, Senator Janssen's district, Senator Dierks, a lot of the rural area, people that used to carry their firearms in the open, in their vehicles, have now "throwed" 'em under the seat, behind the seat, somewhere like this, because they don't want to open this up where people can see them and have more opportunity probably to steal them. And when they throw them behind the seat or under the seat, they become a concealed weapon. So these are just a few points I wanted to
