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must all be in favor of this bill. So at the very end of the conversation I said, well, could I see a show of hands of the folks in this room who support this bill. And I doubt that there was even a third of the people in that room who raised their hands. Now that's very unscientific and very unofficial. But I think that the poll results we can count on. And I would also be opposed to putting it on the ballot. I mean I don't think this is a very good use of ballot space when it's our job to decide on this particular issue. Can you just imagine the money that would be spent on this issue, and maybe that's...maybe that's good. Maybe that is another economic development argument. Lots of money would be spent on promoting this particular ballot issue. And I'm not sure but that would be just shuffling our responsibility off on someone else. This bill will make a difference to law enforcement. I was driving back from Omaha last night, with my husband, and it was about eleven-thirty in the evening. And we noticed a truck had...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...been pulled over by a State Patrol officer. And I said to my husband, it would be very scary to be out in the dark, all by yourself, and going up to a strange vehicle and not knowing who or what was in that vehicle. I think it would be more scary if we had concealed carry in this state. And the law enforcement officers, and I'll turn my light on again, law enforcement officer organizations and rank and file have been opposed to this particular piece of legislation. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator "Shamber". Senator Kiel, followed by Senator Tyson, to speak on the Chambers amendment. Senator Kiel.
