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additional permits be issued?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: There...Senator, I'm not concerned there's going to be any shortfall.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if there were?

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I'm not concerned.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. (Laugh) That's a good way to answer a question. What you're asking is never going to happen, so why give an answer. This is Senator Schellpeper's bill. There are two senators on this bill. If it were a double-barreled shotgun, one of the barrels is Schellpeper, and the other barrel is Janssen. Now Janssen is willing to fire whenever necessary, Schellpeper is always a dud, always a misfire, always blanks. But here's what I have to say for Senator Schellpeper, he learned from last year. This bill is a dud, totally worthless, has no merit whatsoever, and he's not going to embarrass himself trying to make sense out of nonsense. Now, I'd like to ask a question of Senator...Senator Tyson, who told us that story about the unfortunate animal and the two human beings.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Tyson, would you yield?

SENATOR TYSON: Maybe.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Tyson, I think it would give this issue more stature than it merits by putting it on the ballot. But now that that's aside, suppose it were put to a vote of the people and the vote was against it. What would your posture then be, other than prostrate on the ground, but forgetting that, what would your position be relative to bringing a bill like this before the Legislature again?

SENATOR TYSON: If that were determined by the people of Nebraska, and they said they did not want it, as far as I'm concerned, that closes...that closes the question, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I thought that would be your position,
