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young woman said she was afraid that standing in a line to go to a theater that she didn't know who would, you know, who would be having a weapon. Well, in the first place, you know, they wouldn't be able to bring it into the theater if it was posted. In the second place, I asked her, I said, you know, Jen, do you really know who has one now? Well, no, she said, I don't. I said what makes you...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...think then that, you know, that this would be everyone would have one carrying one now? Well, she...I don't know that. So, after visiting with her for awhile, she said I still probably would not support your legislation but I am relieved to hear the hoops that people have to go through to secure one, and she said possibly they would...I would might...well, she, I would much rather see someone carrying a handgun or having a concealed weapon in their car that has had some type of training. So that, you know, that...how many...how many vehicles do you meet on the highway now that have a weapon in their car? If they have it laying on the seat, that's fine. There's no law against that as long as it is in plain...plain sight.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Thank you, Senator Janssen. Further discussion on the Chambers amendment, Senator Kiel.

SENATOR KIEL: Mr. Lieutenant Governor, you sound like you have a cold. Do you? (Laugh) Members of the Legislature, there's one thing I wanted to quickly respond to. The reference was made to certain countries in history that have disarmed their citizens. I had an opportunity to talk to Rabbi Asrael (phonetic) in Omaha this weekend about this bill and some of you may know that he suffered through the horror of Nazi Germany, and he asked me to pass a message on and that was, anybody who uses that as an example of why we should pass this bill is dead wrong and that this was...that that could not be used as an excuse to do this kind of thing, and I wanted to make sure that I got that into the record. I want to talk a little bit about another aspect of what we're...the message that we're sending with this bill and I, as I have mentioned before, I've talked about the relationship between women and who they
