

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, how is the State Patrol going to know that that's this person's practice? Why is that even in the bill? Isn't that just one of those sops thrown out there to try to placate everybody? It cannot be enforced. It means nothing and kind of takes away from the credibility of the bill. Wouldn't you agree with that?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I would imagine though with the back...if they took a background check with people who know the individual who's applying and they got a report from friends, associates, so on, that this man is, you know,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...he drinks a lot...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So are you...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...or he's been arrested, you know, he...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...are you telling me that in the process of this background check they're going to go through a person's neighborhood, knock on doors and pry into this person's business by getting rumor and statements from people?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that how they're going to conduct it?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I would imagine they would look at the record, if they've ever been arrested for a DWI or have been in scraps or fights and so on.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, but if they haven't done that, if they have never fallen into the clutches of the law this provision cannot really be enforced, can it?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Not if the person has never been convicted of DWI or any abuse to anyone from the extent of using alcohol. No, they wouldn't.
