SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, I don't know. I can't speak for you, Senator Chambers,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I wouldn't.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...whether you'd do that or not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that I would pull out a gun and offer it to him? You think I'm going to have a gun in my hand dealing with a white cop at midnight? Do you think that, Senator Ray Janssen?
