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SENATOR BOHLKE: ...without the purse.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Without the purse.

SENATOR BOHLKE: And so do you think the average working woman is going to find that somewhat of a burden, \$400 without the purse, which...let's just round that off to a hundred...

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...for...we're at \$500.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Do you think that that's somewhat of a burden and that are we only allowing protection to women who are of a higher economic...have more income and can afford this?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I don't believe so. If they feel as though that their own personal protection, might call it protection or security, is worth...is worthy of that cost, I believe that they would...they would find the money for it. Knowing the female race as little as I do...

SENATOR BOHLKE: Careful.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...that if they...if they really, really need something they find means to procure that money or save the money. It all depends what their situation is, Senator Bohlke. If they are working in an area that...traveling to and from that workplace, whether they feel as though that it's in an undesirable section that they have to go through where this could happen, not only an undesirable section but just right out in some of the better parts of town. If they feel as though that they...that they need this protection, I don't think that the monetary value of that is going to be that...that big a thing.

SENATOR BOHLKE: And so currently, under current law, if a woman felt so threatened and thought she needed that protection, she could walk to her car with a gun. The only thing...
