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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...is, those who may be thinking of attacking her, would know that she had a gun.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Not necessarily.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Well, would they be more likely to know she had a gun because it had to be carried out in the open?

SENATOR JANSSEN: If they were abiding by the law, yes, yes, they would.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Well, would they have to be abiding by the law to use their eyes to see that the woman had the gun out in the open?

SENATOR JANSSEN: If she had it out...

SENATOR BOHLKE: If an attacker was looking at a woman and she had a gun out in the open, are they more likely to know that the woman has a gun to protect herself than if it's concealed?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Absolutely.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Absolutely.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Therein lies my point. If we're really worried about security and if you're truly...if that's the case, you have just said that the person attacking the woman would know more certainly that she was armed if she were carrying it in the open.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Thank you.
