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SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Price, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR PRICE: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor and members of the body. I have had an opportunity to visit with people that live here in the city and then this weekend I was away into where I grew up, in a rural area, and discussing this legislation that is right before us, and most people that I visited with oppose concealed weapons, although they may have weapons that they have for the sport of hunting and for use on their farms and just for, as I said, for sport. So I have been consistent in my opposition to this bill. I will continue because I do not believe that we need as many guns as accessible out in the community as there will be, and I do believe that gun sales are going to increase sizably. I am consistent and I will give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you're recognized.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Price. Members of the Legislature, I'm afraid Senator Janssen has fallen into one of those traps that a lot of people do when they're talking about what happened during the Nazi Regime, and specifically with reference to the Holocaust. The Holocaust did not take place because somebody said you can't carry guns. I'd like to ask Senator Janssen a question. Senator Janssen.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You know that Hitler was the Chancellor of Germany, don't you?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.
