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SENATOR CHAMBERS: How did Hitler get to be Chancellor?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So that's a propaganda piece...

SENATOR JANSSEN: I...I would...yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...like these others where people say they have a particular point.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And those people are saying...

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's an opinion.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that there would not have been a Holocaust if guns had not been restricted?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, they're...no, they're not saying that. They're making a statement of what, the specific dates and so on, which these laws that were passed by the Nazi Regime.
