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operation you could expand it. And how...how broad can you expand it? Well, it went by classifications, was the system chosen, and a class I could expand to a class II, and a II to a III, and a III to a IV with a maximum animal unit addition, and a IV could expand up to 50 percent of what they had January 1st of 1999. What does that tell you in terms of the additional number of animal units this amendment allows? Basically, it would work like this, and you can think of it in terms of what the maximum allowance would be and that would give you a kind of scale to work from. If you were somebody out there in one of these areas that had no cattle operation right now but you had the expectation of having one or you thought you'd want to have one in the future, you're limited to a maximum of 1,000 animal units. That's all you'll ever be able to build in one site, is 1,000 animal units. If you were lucky enough to already have an operation there and it was a class I operation, which you'll recall the maximum number of animal units was 1,000, you could expand up to 5,000 animal units, so you could expand by 4,000 animal units, even though a person who had no operation could only expand by 1,000 animal units. If you are a little larger and had a class II operation, you could expand by as much as 19,000 animal units, 19,000 animal units. And if you had a class III operation, you could expand by as much as 25,000 animal units. And then, if you were the very largest, you could still expand it. There's no limitation on the expansion. It depends on your size. But certainly even one of the smaller units of that size could expand by 12 or 13 thousand units. Okay, look at the numbers that we're talking about--1,000, 5,000, 19,000, 25,000--and it seems to award and give more leeway and room to expand to the larger operations. So, for example, if in one of these areas you had just five class II operations, if you had just five of them and they all maximized their expansion, you could have 90,000 additional animal units in that one trout stream area. And five class II operations, a class II operation remember is between 1,000 and 5,000 animal units, so it's not all that large, but with just five of them there the expansion could be 90,000 animal units. So the question is, I think, whether that kind of system, first of all, is fair to the small guy 'cause, at least from my perspective, you ought to let the small guy get bigger at the same number of animal units as the larger guy. And, secondly, you ought to ask yourself, are we really protecting the stream if 90,000
