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on a 20,000-unit operation, is a 20 percent expansion factor, which maybe everybody calls small, but I would think you could say that that was a fairly significant expansion. But if you don't know the impact of the kinds of expansions that are allowed under the committee amendment, if there's been no testimony or nothing there that would suggest what might be right, would it make some sense to start cautiously, that is, to allow a modest expansion to see how that worked in terms of monitoring the water and ascertaining whether the degradation of the stream was occurring or not occurring? Because it seems to me that the operators would want to be in a position where they would never have to cut back on their operations because of what was happening to the stream. Let me ask you, what would happen in the future...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...if they expanded in accordance with the terms of this bill and then the quality of the trout stream went dramatically downhill and was a catastrophe? What...what then would we do?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Well, first of all, Senator Beutler, I don't think all of them are going to expand. Matter of fact, the reverse could happen. But at the present time in that area of the state there's one class IV, Dinklage Feeding Company. There's three (sic) class III's: Minatare Feedlot, Larsen Feeding, Short Spear Feeding, and Panhandle Feeders. And these are viable operations and should they choose to expand we were very concerned about the limitations that we could place upon them, and so we agreed with this, with the livestock...with the Cattlemen Association that we would limit. They didn't like this, but we wanted some type of limitations. This is what we agreed to. We only know of one hog facility in that area. Matter of fact, we only know of one class II hog facility in any of these areas. Now that doesn't mean...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Senator Beutler, you're recognized on your time now.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Schrock, please continue.
