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events for us to take, and I do not discount anything that Senator Landis said, and I don't think the world will collapse and all of the creditors go away if this amendment is not adopted. But it does provide us to retain generally neutral principles and maintain the balance that, quite frankly, is working very well today without the specter of someone being disadvantaged, or one person being on first base while the other one is relegated to the outfield. Vote, of course, your own conscience. This retains, again I think it's extremely important, the principle that is current law that information on the real estate needs to be part of the information that can be determined...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...when a...when a lien search is made for someone that's considering extending credit. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. The question before the body is the adoption of the Coordsen amendment to the committee amendments or to the bill. All those in favor say aye, all opposed say nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Mr. Clerk, record.

CLERK: 13 ayes, 14 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you. The amendment is adopted or is not adopted, and we're back to discussion of the bill. Senator Stuhr is recognized.

SENATOR STUHR: (Mike not on) ...the Legislature, I have a couple of questions I'd like to address to Senator Landis.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll do my best.

SENATOR STUHR: These aren't difficult. I just wondered how many states have actually passed similar legislation? Are we one of the first states to adopt this model legislation on the
