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And then Long Pine (inaudible) their streams out around Scottsbluff area, they actually developed later because of the water table above them. And I'm wondering if that would happen in another part of the state. Maybe from the Calamus or one of the other dams, we could have some more class A streams, and then we'd be passing legislation here that would affect the whole state. And it sure is hard to pass legislation here on the floor with all these amendments, because when you get back home, well, you decided you did something wrong. And so I think something like this, if we could work this out in the committee would have been better to bring it out that way, but it didn't happen that way. So, I guess, with my concerns on it and how it could affect the whole state with this one amendment, I'm going to have to vote against this amendment until I see something that will change my mind. But I just think it's just going to be something for the whole state. Again, thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jones. Senator Beutler, followed by Senator Schrock and Schellpeper. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, it...this is not intended to be an earth-shaking amendment. It's a clarification amendment and it comports with what I believe to be the intent of the introducers of the bill. And I would...I guess, I would ask Senator Schrock, if I may...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, would you yield?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I assume, Senator Schrock, that it was your intention, the intention of the committee to include in the bill any and all class A streams whenever they might be designated. Wouldn't that be accurate?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Beutler, that's accurate. I understand the council will be considering Plum Creek, which is a tributary of Long Pine. And, if it becomes classif...or designated as a class A cold water stream, it will be added to the map and will become a protected area.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR SCHROCK: And that can take place without this
