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class A trout stream, or at least that's what I understand. And I know, from my experience, that it also requires a specific water temperature, it requires a specific water flow, it requires a specific...you have to have gravel in the streambed, if you're going to have a stream that supports reproduction. And I suppose that all of those things are subsumed in the language that says "supports natural reproduction of salmonid population". But there aren't any additional criteria that I can find in the rules and regulations. I'm told that they will consult with Game and Parks. Game and Parks will advise them about whether these...the other criteria have been met, and that there is an additional part of the process that involves EPA. All of that is a process that I am completely unfamiliar with. And I am uncertain about what kind of legislative direction we have given for that process. I'm told that we should read the statutes and we should read 81-1501, I think, and it says that the basic, underlying test for the kinds of rules and regulations that I'm talking about is...better look it up here, I think it's the public health and interest. Well, then it is supplemented with 1505, 81-1505. Then that's supplemented with additional language that says, "classifications and standards may be made applicable to the state as a whole or to a designated area and should be made with special reference to health, economic and social factors and physical effects on property". Now those are...those are generalized terms, "public health and welfare", "health, economic and social factors and physical effects on property". If we gave those kind of standards to local decision makers, I might not be as uncomfortable. And I think they have those kinds of standards that they can apply as a part of local zoning processes, if they want to do that. Maybe somebody will advise me that they can't, but I think that they probably could.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Those kinds of decisions, I think, even though we give the authority to make designations by area of the state, I'm beginning to be of the opinion that those are more appropriately local decisions. I am more and more uncomfortable with the kind of broad standards that we are allowing actions to be taken under for the kinds of classifications that would be allowed in this bill and have implications for activities in a
