SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bromm, this amendment that's being offered now is based on the proposition that something was put into the law under the impression it may have been required by the federal government, when in fact it was not?

SENATOR BROMM: It's a little more than that, Senator Chambers. It's something that we did that I don't think we even knew that we did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who do you include in that "we"?

SENATOR BROMM: Senators who were here on the floor. (Laughter.) Certainly, myself and those senators who have an interest that I've spoken with, who are on the committee, and no one seemed to realize they did it, and so then we began to question, well, why did we do it, and did we have to do it? And...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Which committee is this we're speaking of?

SENATOR BROMM: This would...this would hap...this would be the Transportation Committee.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And are the people who are on the Transportation Committee now the same members who were on it at that time?

SENATOR BROMM: Not...not entirely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, some of the members of that committee would be innocent, in terms of putting us where we are today.

SENATOR BROMM: Some would, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think on occasion we may hasten a bit too much and be a bit too quick to adopt what we think the federal government requires of us when, in our own judgment, we may not agree?

SENATOR BROMM: I...I...yeah, I think that could happen and has happened.
