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kangaroos, anyway, or quasi kangaroos. The Legislature is too quick to do favors to people that they know. During the discussion at that time, nobody could give a rational reason to let these people carry these pistols, except that they wanted them. Now you have them armed. And what good has it done the state? It creates the appearance of militarism in the state and on the highway. And maybe more and more legislators are coming to the mind-set where that's what the state is to be about. Anybody who works for the state should wear some kind of uniform. And following the uniform goes a gun. And the only time a person should have a gun is if there is an intent, at some point, to use it to take a life. These people who are dealing with these trucks are not cops, they're not law enforcement officers. They should not be packing pistols. And every time I get a chance to say something, I am. And I'm going to find a bill to offer an amendment to take those pistols away from them. Now I might let them have air guns, BB guns, bean shooters and slingshots. They don't need pistols. They're exactly the reason we don't want children to play with matches. Why in the world do they want to be carrying pistols? Because it makes them feel big and important. I'm going to see if I can find that picture that appeared in the papers, where they had their pants stuck down in their boots. I'd like to ask Senator Cudaback a question, because he's sitting there minding his own business. (Laughter.)

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Cudaback, do you wish to respond?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Cudaback, when you were younger, did you ever ride a bicycle?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I can't remember when I was younger, but, yes.
