to their license, you have some inconsistency between that provision and if the person was on an extended revocation or suspension, like a 15-year suspension, and they served 5 years in prison, they certainly shouldn't be able to cancel out the balance of that 10 years and get their license when they walk out of the institution. Because of the inconsistency that's created and because the law isn't being, as far as I can tell, followed now, it was suggested as part of 589 by DMV that this section of statute be repealed. And so that's it in a nutshell. Now I do know that there have been requests made by inmates upon their release for their driver's license. And to the best of what I am being told those requests are being denied. So that's the purpose of this section of the amendment. If you would not adopt this amendment, you would leave in statute the procedure that I've described. And I've got a copy of the statute, the primary statute here, if I...I did not make copies, but I'd be happy to do that and distribute it, if anyone would like. So, thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Debate on this portion of the divided amendment? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I tried to follow what Senator Bromm was saying, so I'm going to ask him a few questions so that I'm clear. Senator Bromm, I looked at Section.... We're talking about Section 60-4,101 at this point. Is that the one we're talking about that will be...
