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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, so then your point is that the license should not be deemed suspended just because a person is locked up.

SENATOR BROMM: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that your argument?

SENATOR BROMM: I...I don't see any reason for that either.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, I agree with that.

SENATOR BROMM: How would...how would they use it? They're locked up. How are they going to use it?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the effect of striking this language then would mean that a person's driver's license does not even come into the picture simply because he or she goes to prison.

SENATOR BROMM: That's my understanding and my intent.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if that's your intent, then I agree with you. I thought something else. So I'm not going to object to this portion of the amendment either. And I will have a chance to explore it further with Senator Bromm. And, if it turns out that something else will result from it, then we would have an opportunity between now and...

SENATOR BROMM: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Select File.

SENATOR BROMM: Right, I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But in view...in view of your explanation, I don't have any objection to the repealer.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Further debate on this portion of the committee amendment? Senator Bromm, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR BROMM: Very briefly. Again, Mr. Speaker, and...my understanding of the explanation is that this, what I would call
