

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me ask you this question. Would you be opposed...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How many years have you been involved in trucking, roughly?

SENATOR BAKER: Oh, quite a few.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Baker, during all the years that you have been involved in trucking, have you heard of instances where people driving trucks had menaced these people at the weigh stations?
