Their best is not good enough for me. If you were a teacher and you're supposed to give a grade to students, a number or letter grade, based on how many questions they answer correctly out of the total number of questions given, maybe a person has done his or her best and answers three questions out of a hundred, so you say, well, they did the best they could, so I'm going to look at their intention and how well they tried and, instead of giving them 3 percent, I'm going to give them 97 percent. You're not going to do that. A baseball player is very popular, so he comes up to bat. He strikes out the first time, strikes out the second time, strikes out the third time. Well, his batting average for that day is zero, zero, zero, point...it's .000, but since you like him you say we're going to make it .545, so he looks good. You wouldn't do it in baseball. When these young athletes are accused of shaving points in athletic contests, they literally become federal cases. Then, when we're talking about legislation, laws that govern people's lives and affect their property and their personal and individual rights, everything goes out the window and we say, well, somebody was trying to draft a bill in compliance with federal regulations and this is the best they could do, so it ought to be accepted. It's not the...it's not good enough for me. But I'm not going to try to rewrite this whole bill. I'm going to offer amendments to take time and to weaken it in what it's trying to do. I'm not opposed to saying don't let people have open alcohol containers in a vehicle. But I'm going to show you, brothers and sisters, how poorly drafted this is as we get into those things. One thing that I'm wondering about, and this is not the area I was just touching on, why are you going to let people who are riding in vehicles where they pay money to ride in them have open containers of alcohol? Because the people who run those vehicles have lobbyists and they have political power and you all are going to stand on this floor like the hypocrites and say we're interested in saving lives and protecting people, so if you drink in a car where you paid to ride, such as a limousine, then that's not dangerous, because you're just a passenger. But if you're riding in your neighbor's car and you're sitting there drinking but you're not driving, that violates this law. What kind of craziness is that? It shows the hypocrisy we get into when we try to base things on morality. Don't even talk about right and wrong. Don't talk about saving lives. Just talk about the money that you want to
