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SENATOR BROMM: (Laugh) Thank you, Senator Crosby, for addressing me. Fellow senators, this amendment...this amendment will remove the portion of FA82 starting with...with the...in line 27 with the "(a)" down through the "(b)" in line 2 of the following page. So it removes the language that says: "the removal or impoundment of such owner's motor vehicle or motor vehicles or the rendering of such motor vehicle or motor vehicles inoperable", and now that the amendment was adopted the words, "but in no case shall any vehicle be damaged or destroyed". Those will be...those words will be out. We have...we have determined that leaving in the language providing that immobilization or immobilized means the revocation or suspension of the motor vehicles or motor vehicle's registration, including license plates, at the discretion of the court, will be satisfactory, will work as far as an increased penalty that the court could impose, and for point of clarification this would mean vehicles that the convicted repeat offender had in his name. Now, if he had it in his name and his wife's name, it would still include that vehicle if his name was on it. Now, if he was driving someone else's car and his name was not on the registration, then it would not apply to that. And I don't see Senator Beutler over there, but he had...he had some questions in that regard. So this applies to...this changes the definition so that we're not dealing with removal or impoundment but we're dealing with the revocation or suspension of the registration and license plates of the vehicle or vehicles that this convicted person has in their name. Thank you, Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Discussion on the Bromm amendment, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, in addition to paying attention to what is before us in terms of the legislation, I'm an observer of the human scene. I observe my colleagues all the time. I observe them when they're speaking. I observe those who are just kind of sitting around. I observe those who are kind of in a state of limbo, and I can draw assessments of each person, in my mind, which I will never share entirely with anybody. But I notice that others, when they're presenting an issue, cannot do as I do. When it seems like nobody is paying attention, what they're offering just...it
