starts on a mountain top, then it gets on a steep slope and it just kind of comes down very rapidly, then it just fades away into nothingness and, since nobody's listening, well, that's it and thank you. I would have taken all of my ten minutes on this amendment, if I were Senator Bromm, because this is one of the best amendments he's ever offered in his life, and he got disheartened because people weren't paying attention. But, Senator Bromm, I was paying very close attention, and because they were not listening to you, because you're so nice and accommodating, I'm going to tell them what this amendment does. In this part that we have been discussing dealing with the removal or impoundment of the vehicle and rendering it inoperable, Senator Bromm is doing away with the necessity of us discussing that at all by taking all of that language out. Senator Redfield, instead of taking a bobby pin and a hairpin and digging down in that old rotten tooth and trying to get it out and you couldn't get all the rot out with that so you take an ice pick and do something else, that doesn't work, so you take a nail and try to dig it out and you can't do that, Senator Bromm is behaving like a competent oral surgeon. He's going to remove the diseased part entirely and maybe bring, Senator Bromm, this diseased object we're dealing with a little closer to health. But it still is somewhat ill, Senator Smith. We must still work on it. But I appreciate the fact that Senator Bromm is willing to let go of those things that are not really essential, based on what the federal government is requiring, but which will be very controversial, can raise questions of how these things will impact on citizens, and also which are written in such a way that nobody, due to the vagueness, can be sure precisely what is meant or intended. Senator Janssen explained what he would mean by these words. Senator Bromm explained what he felt the purpose of the federal regulations were, and I see it as an undermining of the constitution. So, by removing that language, Senator Bromm is performing a very positive act this morning. However, brothers and sisters, because somebody has offered a worthwhile amendment has never discouraged me from using time when I thought it was necessary to discuss an issue such as we're facing in this bill. The reason I have to discuss other aspects of the bill, at least in general terms, is because I will run out of time to speak when we get to that particular division. Now, the green copy tells us what was to be presented to us when Senator Bromm bought the...brought the bill. Other
