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drunken drivers. We're talking about people who not only endanger themselves, they endanger the lives of others. They threaten the economic viability of the family unit. I'm more worried about that child losing their parent than losing their car for a short period of time while they're in college. And so I'm not saying I'm...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...I'm not saying I'm adverse to looking at ways to improve the language. I do like the...I do like the concept in the language that I see in Senator Beutler's amendment. We're going to try to, if we run out of time and we got to do something, we'll...you know, I would rather adopt this and try to clean it up later. But I think maybe we can...we can make it work in better with the bill and the amendment if we can redraft it right now, so that's what we're attempting to do. Having said that, I'm...I want to be perfectly clear that I am in favor of putting in a hardship procedure, especially for a spouse or another employed family member, and I think we can do that. So I think we should work at that and try to get this drafted and adopted. Thank you, Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Chambers, on the Beutler amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, since there is going to be some reworking, I won't have to say too much on that aspect of it, but I do support the amendment and I'm in complete agreement with what Senator Redfield indicated, that the language is too narrow. But I think Senator Beutler might have been trying to come up with something that might be acceptable. In view of the apparent consensus, although only two or three people have spoken, something can be done along this line, but I'd like to ask Senator Beutler a question about one aspect of his amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Beutler, will you yield?
