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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, now the fun begins. I would like to begin by asking Senator Bromm, if that federal regulation has a definition or explanation of the words "other receptacle"?

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Bromm, will you yield?

SENATOR BROMM: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And he's checking, so I'm going to give him an opportunity to do so.

SENATOR BROMM: In a cursory look, Senator Chambers, I do not see a definition of "other receptacle". We will continue to search, but it does not appear to be there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me ask you a question, Senator Bromm. Is a sponge a receptacle?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, in my...I guess, in my plain, simple understanding, I would not say so; I would say no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, if a person had a sponge drenched with alcohol, that person would not be in violation of this law, isn't that true?

SENATOR BROMM: That could be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you know why I bring it up? Some people might think that that's really a stretch, but in the old days musicians in clubs would put a marijuana joint in a chicken bone, a hollowed-out chicken bone, and would smoke in that manner openly. And although people knew it, there was not the joint visible. So there are ways. Now, suppose a person is consuming alcohol by way of a sponge. There is nothing in any law that would prohibit that, either existing law or this new one, is there? Because they're talking about containers, aren't they?

SENATOR BROMM: Right, Senator Chambers. And I...maybe I didn't understand the question. But I was going to point out that
