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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...wouldn't it? Wouldn't it?

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, I really apologize. I couldn't hear you. I need to have you repeat that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, that's okay, because you make...the way people are pulling on you reminds me of a verse in the Bible where the carcass is there will...it says, the eagles be gathered together, but I like to say, where the carcass is, there will the buzzards be gathered together. You're like that little piece...I use this term advisedly. You're like that little, bitty piece of carrion, out there on the desert, and you got about 30 vultures trying to get you and pull you different ways at once, and there just isn't enough to go around. So whenever you aren't occupied, let me know, and I'll just repeat the question.

SENATOR BROMM: All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Because you're going to be asked a lot about this bill. Under the language of this bill any container holding the candy that contains the alcohol or the alcoholic liquor, or the cake that contains alcoholic liquor would constitute the open receptacle, for purposes of this law. Isn't that true?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Senator Beutler, to speak on the second component of the divisible question, FA83. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Bromm, if we could exchange ideas here for a moment. I guess this is the recycler question, or the garbageman question. But it has to do with the possession portion of the bill again. And it seems to indicate that the bottle, can or receptacle that cannot be possessed may contain any amount of alcoholic liquor.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, would you yield?
