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SENATOR BROMM: Yes, Senator Beutler, I would say so.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And I assume that if there is a trace of alcohol anywhere in the can, that that's probably then containing an amount of alcohol. Right? I mean...

SENATOR BROMM: In the literal sense, I think, you're correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right. What about the person that's simply hauling beverage cans to the recycling center? How...how is that person... Are we subjecting that person to prosecutorial discretion and police and law enforcement discretion in that instance?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, I would sure hope not. You know, I guess, if I were worried about it, I'd...if I had a trunk, I'd put them in the trunk, and then you'd certainly have no problem. You could tie them on the roof, you could tie them on the aerial, you could drag them behind and you'd be.... (Laughter) I'm sorry. But, you know, in the...you know, in the literal sense, you're absolutely right. And I have been trying to scratch my head about whether a definition would help us. And sometimes definitions can get you into even deeper than...than not. But, you know, I certainly...I certainly think common sense would tell me that we absolutely don't want to subject those people to any unnecessary problems or harassment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Well, I don't have a good suggestion right at the moment, so maybe...maybe...

SENATOR BROMM: I gave you four of them. (Laugh)

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah. (Laugh) I'm just not sure my constituents would find that a suitable alternative. But there are an awful lot of people, for example, in Lincoln who take things to a recycling center, including alcoholic beverages or leftover containers, and also the recyclers that go around, some of them are small and have vans. I don't know what a "passenger compartment" would be on a small van that had a couple seats torn out in the back and really was hauling recycling products. And maybe you could comment on that when your time is up again. But I would be interested in your opinion as to whether that
