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have those necessarily always in these other types of vehicles; a little bit harder, maybe, to isolate the beverage. But I'll...I'll...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But, as you...as you...

SENATOR BROMM: ...I'll let you respond to that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: As you suggested to Senator Beutler, that they could carry these cans tied to the antenna and so forth, (laughter) I've seen these motor homes,...

SENATOR BROMM: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and they have luggage racks on top.

SENATOR BROMM: Many of them do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Could...and they carry stuff up there. Couldn't they put it up there, while they're moving from one place to the other?

SENATOR BROMM: Um-huh, absolutely.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And thank you for letting me share your time.

SENATOR BROMM: Yeah. And I...I know that this section of the amendment would bring...I knew it would bring considerable discussion. And as we do it, we're certainly reviewing the legal requirements of the federal regulations and trying to walk the line. I do think, as a general principle, I really do, that...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...it's a...it's a...it's a good thing not to have bottles that are...of vodka or anything else, that are partially consumed and open in a passenger compartment of a vehicle. I... And to have open beers in there also, I don't think is a good idea. And so I...I...the fault, if there is any, with this section, I think, is with the extent to which you
