SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, if we adopt this amendment, are you still going to have problems with this section of the bill?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Not the kind that would make me say, if you don't do it my way, then it's no way.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the only reason I'm saying that, the way some of the language is structured, there might be a better way to do that, but it won't be where I'm just totally resistant, as I am to this particular section.

SENATOR BROMM: Um-huh. Well, and I appreciate that. And I... The exemptions that are in the amendment that are being carved out by Senator Chambers are there primarily because those are federally allowed, and primarily because I think it brings on possibly additional opposition to the bill, if we carve those exemptions out. I'm willing to deal with that, if that resistance comes about. So I'm going to support the amendment. Let me say this, and I think very few people realize, or at least people that I talk with don't realize that it has been illegal, under state law, to consume alcohol on the public
