mechanism by which we're operating our motor vehicles on. That's the interstate system. That's the safest system that we have in this state. I am in total agreement with Senator Chambers in saying that we don't need this. We don't need the extra fines. I disagree with what's trying to be done here. I don't think there's a need. If there is a need, it's on the enforcement end of the thing.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR HILGERT: It is not simply, well, let's increase the fines on the people who use the interstate. I do think that it is unfair. At least it appears that way, and in all fairness, I will reiterate some folks who have advocated this, again, perhaps it was a response to a controversy of some many months ago. But on its own in the clear light of a spring day, it certainly doesn't seem to make all that much sense today, and I am not going to support this, and I ask you to support the Chambers amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, this provision of the law, this section of the law offers a fertile field for amendments. I want to remind my colleagues of what we were doing on that terrible gun bill. I had moved to divide the question, which we did, and do you know what we spent all of that time talking about? An amendment that I offered to the first division of that committee amendment. And you know the only two words involved, the two words were "one hundred" and we spent eight hours dealing with variations on the two words "one hundred". Senator Kiel slipped in an amendment but, basically, we spent all of that time. Now imagine what I could have done if we'd had three words like "one hundred ten". Well, we have here all kinds of provisions of law. What I tried to do in the interest of saving time and to make a point was to put four elements into one amendment, the four elements being overwidth, overheight, or overlength, and the fourth one was or overloading. If this amendment fails, then I'm going to try again, and in the same way I tried to work my way from five hundred dollars down, I am going to start working backward on these. The next amendment will be to strike the word
