provide. They provide an integrated, one-stop shopping center for the delivery of health care services to women with an emphasis on preventative care, which I think that by and large that's what we need to be emphasizing, development of a multidisciplinary research agenda on women's health issues, and we have two research institutions in this state that could certainly be involved and are involved. Creighton has just really decided to focus on osteoporosis, for instance, and that would be a good tie-in with this program. Development of strategies to promote women's participation in clinical research trials, which would be very important to some of this research; coordination and linkage of clinical services in academic centers to those in surrounding communities; educational programs and materials on women's health for the general public and health care professionals, using cutting-edge information technologies and telemedicine approaches; the integration of a women's health curriculum into medical school education. This is one area which I think we could be doing more, and I know Senator Crosby you talked about it, but symptoms for heart disease aren't always the same, and there are a lot of doctors out there who frankly were educated years ago and probably didn't receive any education on these different kinds of symptoms. A leadership plan to focus...foster the recruitment, retention and promotion of women in academic medical careers; the integration...or, the networking within the community to form alliances with consumer and health care professional groups, scientific organizations, business groups and public policy leaders to advance women's health. In 1996, the U.S. Public Health Service Office on Women's Health established the first six vanguard National Centers of Excellence, and they were at Boston University Med Center, University of California at Los Angeles, Indiana School of Medicine, the University of Maryland at Baltimore, University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, and Wake Forest University Baptist Medical Center in Winston-Salem. In 1998 or '97 they established six more, and in 1998, they also were going to award six more. I think that is an ongoing program. I can see us being a part of something like that if we have this initiative out there, if we have somebody focusing on these kinds of programs that are available. And I just got mixed up on my list. I kind of mixed the two lists up for 1996 and '97, but that's not important. The important part is that those kinds of programs are out there, and I believe we could
