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grandmothers, my mother was a woman, obviously, former wife, a woman, I have three sisters, three sisters-in-law, about 14 nieces, I don't know how many grand nieces, and all of them have been very, very affectionate toward me, supportive, as much as I will permit, because I'm quite solitary in my living habits and practices. But as a result of being around so many women, I did become aware of some of the problems of a medical nature that are peculiar to females. I have a sister-in-law, I found out about cysts, not sis, as a sister, but cysts, yeast infections, and the types of things which might be relatively common in occurrence, but they are not properly diagnosed. And when they are, sometimes the woman is treated in a way that I feel is brutal. Some of the implements that these doctors will use to treat a woman who has a yeast infection or a bladder infection seemed to smack more of torture to me than medical treatment. The coldness, the lack of sensitivity, which I hope, based on what Senator Crosby said, are things that are gradually going to fall away when doctors treat women. Now all of the women in my family now are black. Maybe white women also get treated this shabbily, and I tend to think that might be the case. But at any rate, one of my sisters-in-law was pregnant and the doctor diagnosed it as a cyst. All he did was felt on her abdomen, he would push, and he would thump and do the things they do, and when she would express discomfort, that convinced him that it was a cyst. That's the kind of diagnosing that was done. She became aware that she was pregnant when she went to another doctor, and she was about eight months along. That might seem unbelievable to some of you all, it would be unbelievable to me if I were not aware of it. I don't like to talk about my ailments, aches and pains. I don't like to hear other people talk about their ailments, and aches and pains, but for some people that's all they have to talk about. And for them that's the only thing that is truly theirs. But I'm not going to go into a long recitation of those types of things, but I wanted to give you a couple of concrete examples. We create classifications based on many, many factors. Just recently we passed a bill that is going to allow physicians to utilize more in the way of controlled substances for the pain of those people who fall into certain classifications and categories. When we see that people, because they are faced with certain types of problems, fit into a class, and that class can be addressed by legislation, we ought to enact such legislation. And that's
