SENATOR SCHIMEK: But...I mean, I'm sure there are other programs as well.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-huh.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I mean there's 5,800 employees over there, Senator, so I'm sure there are some things happening. This would focus and coordinate.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right, thank you, Senator Schimek. Then along those same lines, what...when we...when we had the big merger...

SENATOR COORDSEN: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...you know, we combined the departments together, in your opinion, did we make any headway with the health care issues pertaining to women at that time, when that big conglomerate was put together?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I hate to get into that whole issue, because that...that's kind of a hornet's nest. I don't really know. I don't think I can really answer your question. I know a great deal of time and energy was expended on just the coordination period and how this whole thing was going to be put together. So I think some things probably suffered. I can't document them, but I think some programs probably suffered. When they would have ordinarily had concentration of those employees, they were concentrated more on what the organization should look like.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Schimek, and thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Crosby, please.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I just wanted to correct or perhaps emphasize a few things that maybe I said before that I don't want to leave an impression that, first, I am...I'm supportive of the bill, second, I'm supportive of the Tyson amendment, if he brings it back. I wish he had
