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putting into place law that solidifies islands of monopoly, whether that monopoly is held by the public entity or by the private entity, and...and that what we're doing would give the consumer as many options as possible. Going...going now just from talking about the SIDs, so that the structure is a little better in my mind, Senator Bruning, the other important relationship out there is...is who controls the cities and the little towns, the villages, cities of the first class, second class, and with respect to the service of those entities is it by and large now done through a contract basis, a franchise between the towns and one or another utility? Would that be accurate?

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You yield, Senator Bruning?

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes, I will yield and, yes, Senator, that's correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, that's accurate. And so right now around Douglas and Sarpy County you have some of those entities that are signed up with MUD and some that are signed up with UtiliCorp.

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Are there any others involved? Those two...

SENATOR BRUNING: No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...we talking about these two?

SENATOR BRUNING: Those are the only two in this area.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, these are the two dinosaurs that are...

SENATOR BRUNING: (Laugh) Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...have their necks in trying. Okay, so what we seem to be saying is that let's say...let's say right now there's a little town out there, we won't say which one, but
