SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If pipe A is already in place and pipe B is put in place, will that which is in pipe A bleed into pipe B and, by a binary combination, like these missiles that have gases, we will get a combination of gases which is poisonous to the public?

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that what's going to happen?

SENATOR BRUNING: No, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the only danger is if somebody cuts through one of these pipes.

SENATOR BRUNING: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you feel if there are two pipes there is a higher likelihood that one of them or both will be cut through than if there's just one?

SENATOR BRUNING: It's happened in the area, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the one who is most concerned about this, though, is the private company. Is that right?

SENATOR BRUNING: The private company was most concerned about its investment in the area, certainly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But not safety. You're talking about safety, but they were talking about their investment...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and the safety is just kind of spread on top to make palatable the other aspect. Isn't that true?
