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in their first effort with this. They contracted with Touche Ross to analyze their services and that's how...that's how they got into the program in the first place, telling them what...what therapies were eligible for this reimbursement. And there are other...other entities out there that...that will contract with schools if they desire to do it, or the schools can do it on their own. But the problem is, if they do it on their own, they may not recognize all of those areas that are eligible for recovery and they may leave some more money on the table. So it's just like whether you want to receive professional advice. You can, if you don't...but you don't have to.

SENATOR JONES: Thank you. And appreciate that because I realize they could save some money, but they might miss some money, but the way I understand it is that they would apply for things like special ed, and you might list all them things that they can apply to get reimbursed for. That would help I think to have that on record.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: That's right. I've got list here of some of those from another state that shows, and there are 17 different areas of potential reimbursement.

SENATOR JONES: Thank you.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Thank you.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Thank you, Senator Jones. Senator Byars, on the amendment to the amendment.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Senator Bohlke. Just in response a bit to Senator Raikes also, one of my questions followed the same line of questioning that his did and those people who are very acquainted with this, applying for these type of funds in other states have seen in many instances these dollars going for one-time capital projects: accessible playground equipment, computers, elevators in buildings that are not now totally ADA accessible. And one thing that they've stressed to me that it's not their intention to use these dollars to hire additional staff; it's to supplement and take the place of funds that they're already spending out of General Fund dollars.
