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telegraph or telephone company could have included a public company or not. But at least under your new definition it can include public entities. A utility company, for example, could be a telecommunications company, by definition of providing that service, or could it?

SENATOR BROMM: I don't think it could, Senator Beutler. We...and I don't...I don't have it here, I guess, but I think we have a definition of a telecommunications company in 86-802, which isn't in the...is it 86-803? Okay, well we're saying it's in 86-802. But it may be in 803. So that's defined there, and I don't think that includes...I know it doesn't include the entity that you're speaking of.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Let me then just ask maybe to find for me later on where that would be, because I was looking at 86...

SENATOR BROMM: We'll find that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...86-802, it says, "A telecommunication company means any person, partnership," dah, dah, dah, dah, ..."or governmental entity offering telecommunications service for a fee"...

SENATOR BOHLKE: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ..."in Nebraska interstate commerce". So, am I not reading something in that definition, or is it some other definition elsewhere that precludes it?

SENATOR BROMM: It's...counsel just handed me subsection (16) under 86-802, "telecommunications company means any person, firm, partnership, limited liability company, corporation, association, or governmental entity offering telecommunications service for a fee in Nebraska interstate commerce." So, that's the definition, Senator Beutler. Are we on your time or mine? I can't remember.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, we're on my time,...

SENATOR BROMM: (Laugh.) Okay.
