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the line itself can be narrowly construed as saying there shall be a line. That may not necessarily include the conduit that the line has surrounding it. There's at points where you have to enhance the signals, that's done as sort of a boost in some places.

SENATOR BOHLKE: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And some of those are related to the actual transmission line. That's how I read that. To the extent that that could be clarified, I'm unwilling to do it off the cuff. I'm sure not unwilling to look at doing that when I've got time to measure and look at it. I don't see that as a big wall or hurdle to jump through. The other issue of consent, certainly because the city has some interest in their powers of protecting that infrastructure, consent is necessary from them because they've invested a tremendous amount of money in the streets and some of the public works that are there. And they have an interest in, not only protecting that, but making sure that there isn't other related damages, unless the issue of consent is necessary from them, but I don't think it would necessarily...

SENATOR BOHLKE: Time.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...be appropriate from some of the private individuals.

SENATOR BOHLKE: There are no further lights on the bill. Senator Kristensen. There's an amendment.

CLERK: Senator Beutler would move to amend by striking Section 1, Madam President. (See FA95 on page 1341 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Beutler, to open on your amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Kristensen, all I want to do is take a couple more minutes and...and...

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Kristensen.
