SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, I don't...it would not be my intention to exempt all related companies or all companies that might be under a holding company. I think...I think, clearly, the same company for the same business certainly would be exempt. It may well be that with this thing, as with so many other things in life, there are situations out there and relationships that the Legislature itself cannot always anticipate, and so the Public Service Commission is empowered to make rules and regulations and, to some extent, over time we will define and refine and if we don't like the way they do it, we do our usual thing, Senator, and come in here and make a change.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum. Well, the same thing would...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: (Gavel.)

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...would probably hold true with car manufacturers, if you buy a car and you pay cash for it and...and the company does want to come back and check to see if, you know, as they do now and sometimes it is a little bothersome, how do you like your car, how many miles do you...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...have on it, so on, so forth, then that...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Certainly that would be exempted.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That would...that would also be an exemption. And you say you patterned this after the Georgia law, is that right?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: And how many...would you know how many times they have had to come back and make exemptions? You know, have they come back 10, 12 different exemptions within a course of a year or two?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator, their law is brand new, too, and so...
