that include procedures for working with multiproblem delinquent youth. It allows the entry of foreign child support orders and requires full faith and credit for liens against real and personal property in this state when the proper documents and fees have been provided. Three, it requires the state's juvenile justice system to promote prevention efforts that are community based, stress the offender's responsibility to victims and community, recognize the importance of meeting the educational needs of juveniles, and emphasize parental involvement and accountability. Four, it clarifies the time within a notarized acknowledgment of paternity can be rescinded. Five, it transfers responsibility for childcare licensing and regulation from the Department of Health and Human Services to the Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure, and makes technical changes relating to childcare inspections, reporting, and licensure. It makes technical changes to the License Suspension Act and defines "director" as the director of Health and Human Services or his or her designee, and provides for notice to a licenseholder who is delinquent in complying with a support order. Seven, it changes provisions relating to the practice of pharmacy. It changes the terms both "supportive pharmacy personnel" to "pharmacy technician." It defines pharmacy technician and provides the maximum number of pharmacy technicians who can assist one pharmacist. Current law requires the Attorney General to initiate criminal proceedings against supportive pharmacy personnel, now called pharmacy technicians, and public health clinic workers who knowingly perform tasks or functions that require the expertise or professional judgment of a pharmacist. LB 594 adds dialysis drug or device distributors to that list. It makes a technical change, number eight, to the Hospice Act. It deletes a reference to holding oneself out as a hospice or as providing hospice services and simply prohibits someone from providing hospice services unless they are properly licensed under the Hospice License Act. Nine, it changes provisions relating to the State Trauma Systems Board and regional trauma systems boards. It requires the director of Regulation and Licensure to appoint the chairpersons of these boards, and requires transfer agents between the different levels of trauma centers. It adds the director of Regulation and Licensure or his or her designee to the geographical informational system, or GIS Steering Committee, and increases the size of that committee from 18 to 19 members. And there are
