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or mental impairment. They might after they're able to do some work. But the suggestion that we just simply look to whether or not we'd have a different fiscal note I don't think will work in this particular instance, because we simply don't know. Now...but the issue about whether physical or mental impairments and any distinguishing characteristic between them makes an issue substantially the same for purposes of our rules, I think, is the point. Now, Senator Robak has pointed out that she thinks that there is a difference. I don't whether these kinds of impairments would be something that you would experience in pairs, whether you would experience one or the other. But I guess I can't see any reason, as a policy measure, why, at the point and with the type of language that Senator Robak is suggesting to us, that we would distinguish between either one of them as a policy measure. So I think that the fact that I would be unable to distinguish between them as a policy measure, for the kinds of persons that should be eligible for the homestead exemption, if we make that choice, means that these are substantially the same issues. And I would hope that you would support the Chair.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, this amendment deals with money and it deals with policy. It deals with unfortunate members of this society. There is a profound difference between a physical incapacity and a mental incapacity. I could lose the use of all of my limbs, I could lose, for the purpose of procreation, the use of that member which Viagra is supposed to help. I'm just lying there, a lump of, what we might say, intelligence. But I'm aware of the fact that I'm still a human being, I'm aware of what's going on around me. When I look in people's face I can see the expression on their face and read it. I can understand when people are deeming me to be a burden upon them and all these other things, because I am physically nonexistent, except that I have those vegetable functions that will allow me to stay alive, but my brain is still functioning, clear as a bell, mentally. I get Alzheimer's, it can even be the early stages, the neurons, up here, have something wrong with them. And although doctors are saying now that they're finding some genetic explanation, or some physical explanation, or something that will show why these
