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in those days they always thought that somebody had an ailment, whether physical or mental, because somebody had sinned. So they asked Jesus, who sinned, Lord, this man or his parents? And Jesus didn't say what I'd say, or maybe he said it and those trying to clean him up didn't add...didn't put it in. He said, Fool, that's what he should have said, neither this man, nor the man's parents sinned. This person is here so that you all can witness God's glory in operation. This is a person afflicted with an ailment, not of his doing, nor can be laid at the doorstep of his or her parents. In other words, it's not genetic, he didn't inherit it, he hasn't got it because he went out there and violated God's laws. These things happen, and it happened to him. And I'm going to show you how this ought to be dealt with and then went through whatever those ministrations were and the person was healed. Now here we come, supposedly with a more enlightened view about problems that beset our brothers and sisters. We don't say they're, or we shouldn't say, they're possessed by devils anymore; that demons are what we're dealing with. So instead of giving people treatment and medication to perhaps take care of a mint of physical imbalance, a chemical imbalance, we subject them to religious exorcism's, during which we literally try to beat the devil out of them. We don't do those kind of things anymore, as a society, but the attitude seems to be the same. We would rather a thousand truly mentally...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...disabled people do without than to have one, who might be a malingerer, get something to which we think he or she is not entitled. That is not the approach that I take. I believe these issues are very serious. I believe there are complex aspects of it, even when it comes to administering the program, as Senator Wickersham pointed out. They are not unscolvable, they are not unsurmountable. That's what we are here for. How long did Senator Matzke and I talk about that unemployment compensation bill? What could be more worthy of an expenditure of our time than an issue such as this? We don't have many occasions to deal with a matter of this magnitude or that so directly affects some of the members of this society. And if there is something that we, as a Legislature, can do to bring...
