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property tax relief program, the standards of measurement. Those standards for physical disabilities that are currently in statute are relatively easy to identify. Mental conditions and where you draw the line are much, much, much more difficult. We...there are many physical disabilities that we don't feel...that we have never covered, as a qualifier, that may be as necessary, for fair treatment of everyone, as the mental incapacity that is referenced in this. I think that this is an issue that would be far better left for another bill and another year, or even an interim study effort to attempt to identify a formula and a system...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...that would allow us to allocate these resources to truly needy people in the area of mental incapacity. Don't think we can do it this morning. If we do something this morning, I'll guarantee you we'll be back, trying to fix it in another year. And that doesn't mean that I believe myself to be cruel and heartless, or that I agree with...that I disagree with the statements of Senator Chambers. It simply is not something we were able to do in Revenue Committee, to rewrite a bill to make it work, and I don't think we can do it here. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Coordsen. Senator Bohlke, you are next.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Madam President and members, I do think that at some point in time we are going to have to come up with a standard for how we measure if a person qualifies or not. And, Senator Preister, if you would move to your microphone and yield to a question, please.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Preister, would you like to respond?

SENATOR PREISTER: Yes, I will.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Preister, in determining if a person with physical disabilities qualifies, is it generally upon a recommendation of a physician?
